## **EU MRV Regulations**

Ref. 003-17 Issued 24/04/17

The Ship Registry wishes to advise owners and operators of the forthcoming requirement to comply with EU Regulations on the Monitoring, Reporting and Verification of  $CO_2$  emissions from ships ('MRV'). MRV is seen as the first step towards reducing  $CO_2$  emissions from ships in EU waters.

MRV regulations apply to any Manx vessel meeting **all** of the following criteria:

- Over 5,000gt, and
- Trading to/from an EU or EFTA port, and
- Carrying cargo or passengers (for the avoidance of doubt, this does not include vessels such as pipe/cable laying ships or offshore installation ships)

Vessels which meet the above criteria will need to collect and submit data regarding their  $CO_2$  emissions for each voyage to and from an EU port. The methodology for doing so will need to be in accordance with an MRV Monitoring Plan that has been approved by an accredited MRV verifier. Verified data is required to be submitted to the European Maritime Safety Agency on an annual basis.

We ask relevant parties to note the following deadlines:

- **31 August 2017** deadline to submit Monitoring Plan to an accredited verifier
- **1** January **2018** date to begin monitoring and recording  $CO_2$  emissions in accordance with Monitoring Plan
- **30 April 2019** (and yearly thereafter) date to submit verified emissions data to European Maritime Safety Agency for the previous calendar year
- **30 June 2019** date by which a ship will be issued with an MRV Document of Compliance, subject to satisfactory completion of the above

It should be noted that MRV Regulations are unrelated to forthcoming emission monitoring regulations from IMO that will be given effect via amendments to MARPOL Annex VI; these are currently expected to enter into force during 2018.
