

Isle of Man Ship Registry Technical Advisory Notice



DNV GL name change to DNV

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This TAN has been published to advise that on 1st March 2021 DNV GL changed its name to DNV. A full press release on this name change is available on the DNV website using the link below.

This name change will affect certificates issued by both the Isle of Man Ship Registry and DNV as follows:

1. Continuous Synopsis Records (CSRs)

CSRs are required by SOLAS Reg. XI-1/5 and are issued to Isle of Man registered ships by the Ship Registry. One of the purposes of the CSR is to ensure the identification of the current Recognised Organisation (RO). Considering the name change of DNV GL to DNV this requirement of unique identity is still given and the name change is not considered to be a change of RO.

Therefore the Ship Registry will not re-issue CSR's as a direct result of this name change. Any future changes to the CSR will however incorporate the new name.

2. Certificates issued by DNV GL

All certificates with DNV GL name and logo will still be valid. For management system and product certification, issuing of new DNV branded certificates will start from 1 March. The transition timeline for existing management system certificates is 3 years and 5 years for product certificates. For issuing of new vessel certificates, the transition to new DNV branded certificates will follow a planned process, and will primarily be done at the first upcoming periodical survey for the vessels.
